James Mauney reelected as Bishop

▲ As the results of the first ballot were read, and it became apparent that current Bishop James Mauney had been reelected by a landslide, the 350 plus participants of the Virginia Synod Assembly jumped to their feet in joyous –and prolonged– applause. "Thank you for the invitation to walk with you the next six years," he said. We also reelected Charles Poston as Vice President and Janet Gomez as Secretary of the Synod Council.

▲ In his report to the Assembly, Bishop Mauney said that we are a **Family Church**, passing the faith from one generation to the next; a **Feeding Church** to the many hungry in our neighborhoods, state and world. We are an **Intersection Church**, sharing our faith for the glory of God where our lives intersect with others. We are a **Bridge Church** engaging in dialog with other Christians to share our understanding of the faith and learn from others. And, we are a **Neighborhood Church**, where we seek to know our neighbor and be involved in their needs. The Synod also needs to strengthen the partnership with congregations to successfully minister to our youth.

We have turned the corner

"We had a difficult time. We have turned the corner, and thank you for helping us do it," said David Swartling, Secretary of the ELCA. "Despite the recent turmoil, our faith has survived and thrived! This is not the end of something, but the BEGINNING of something, an opportunity to refocus the church in new ways." Operations in Chicago have been streamlined and financial stability is imminent. Mark Hanson, Bishop of the Churchwide ELCA said through a video, "Things we could never do alone are possible by joining together in ministry. And, as we serve, we are changed by those whom we serve. We seek to do ministry at the intersection of hope and fear."

Q: Who is the ELCA?

A: WE are!

2012 Budget passed

We approved a budget for 2012 in the amount of \$1,951,897.

- This reflects a \$114,000 increase over the current year.
- This will allow us to pass on 38% to Churchwide mission.
- This includes a 2% increase in staff compensation, their first in three years.
- More importantly, we, as a Synod, are moving from assigning a “proportionate share” to a congregation; and asking congregations to tithe (10%) their undesignated income --or grow their percentage if they are already giving more than 10%.
- You can be assured that there is no “fluff” at the Synod level. Every penny is spent wisely and every expenditure is made with caution so that *vital* programs and services can be maintained.

Resolutions and Memorials

1. A Memorial will be sent to the Churchwide Assembly (meeting this August) to support the United Nations General Assembly proclamation that 2011 be the International Year for People of African Descent; and encourage churches to help eradicate racism and deepen ELCA relationships with companion churches in Africa.

2. The Synod declared its openness to the variety of understandings of the 2009 Churchwide decisions regarding ministry policies. Some members and congregations are distressed and feel unwelcome even as they stay in the ELCA. The resolution intends to affirm their presence and recognize the differing views on marriage, family, sexuality and ordination practices.

3. A resolution acknowledging and affirming the ministry of Pastor Patti Thisted Arthur, (who died in September 2010) was passed.

4. Rev. Jean Bozeman, assistant to the Bishop, will retire next month after 50 years of service in the life of the church, 22 of them with the Bishop’s office. In her honor we are seeking to create a \$2.5 million fund for Christian Formation in our Synod to endow lasting funds for the formation of faith within the lives of its people. LLFF = lifelong faith formation

Simply put, this is living a rich life, kindling and growing your faith and understanding of God. Rev. Dr. Jessicah Duckworth, a dynamic speaker, met with the assembly on 3 occasions, pointing out that FAITH is an act of God, and FORMATION is the work of people and congregations. It is in communities (churches, families, etc.) that teaching and learning of Christian practices occur. Many activities are intentional –like Sunday School, adult forums, sermons– while many others are assimilated through family rituals, relationships with others and simple observation.

(Many people now say they are more spiritual than religious. Fewer people are participating in the church. There is greater diversity and individualism, changing patterns of marriage and what constitutes a family unit. And, the digital media cannot be ignored as an instrument of communication and instruction.)

Each of our congregations needs to be aware, discuss and implement new ways to bring the Gospel to the changing world and invite the unchurched into our lives by being involved with them where they are.
